### Big step forward for Alexis

SHE'S facing challenges that most young girls her age will never even be able to fathom but that hasn't stopped fiveyear-old Alexis Hulks being as excited as any child about the prospect of her first day at school.

Alexis was born with oculocutaneous albinism type 2 (OCA2), meaning her eyes are very sensitive to light. This has also left her with a condition called nystagmus, which causes her eyes to move involuntarily back and forth, significantly reducing her distance vision.

On top of her low vision, Alexis had open-heart surgerylastyear after it was discovered a valve hadn't formed properly. Despite having the odds stacked against her so early in life, Alexis is overcoming her challenges and will begin kindergarten on Monday at Tahmoor Public School.

Mother Clarissa said Alexis was as excited as any other child about starting "big" school. "She's like the Eveready bunny right now," she said. "There's no stopping her. "She's had to overcome obstacle after obstacle, she makes me so proud."

Mrs Hulks said Alexis' move into the school system would be a normal process.

"We've met with the teachers and explained about how the normal verbal instructions they might use need to be expanded on and they've been great in understanding it," she said.

"Her distance vision is very poor so when she moves into a new environment she doesn't know she shuts down a little bit but once she gets used to an area there's nothing stopping her.

"She's so strong willed and capable, it's a testament to her just how little help she needs."

# Gutsy barista faces new challenge to find a job

HE OVERCAME horrific burns as a child and is one of Sydney's most creative baristas but Macarthur Gardens' Wez Koni can't get a job.

The 27-year-old's exquisite designs in a coffee mug are almost too good to drink but he is struggling to find a cafe or restaurant prepared to give him a go.

Mr Koni earned a place in our nation's heart when he arrived in Australia at three years of age for the first of more than 30 operations after suffering severe burns to his face and body when he fell into a fire inside his family's home in the highlands of Papua New Guinea. He became well-known after he

was featured on 60 Minutes. The burns left him with limited mobility in his right arm but he still pushes himself to create patterns on his coffees using only a toothpick, food colouring and chocolate sauce.

chocolate sauce.

'T've always been creative but it was only when we bought a coffee machine at Macquarie Fields Salvation Army that I started looking at simple patterns such as swans and love hearts on YouTube," Mr Koni said.

'I never really considered

"I never really considered that my burns were in the way.' I've learnt to use my left hand to do my art and I'm really good at mowing the lawn. I've even learnt how to drive and I used to do furniture removal work."

With that employment history under his belt, Mr Koni is now searching for a





job where he can showcase his free-pour colour coffees and newly developed portrait coffees.

"I want to find somewhere I can do my coffee art but where people can sit down and enjoy the art," he said.

"My favourite part is when I get to see the reactions on people's faces when they see the coffee for the first time. I love seeing that."

Mr Koni practises his craft every day and can create a personal portrait in the froth in less than five minutes.

in less than five minutes.
"I practise because I still
want the coffee to be hot
when we give it to the customer. You really need to
have a steady hand," he said.

#### **SECOND CHANCE AT LIFE**

WEZ Koni was just three years of age when he fell into a fire at his family home in Papua New Guinea and was rushed to Australia to receive emergency medical attention.

Since then, Mr Koni has been under the care of a Melbourne Hospital surgeon, Malcolm Linsell, and has undergone more than 30 operations

including his initial life-saving surgery. Dr Linsell performed the first operation on Mr Koni at Dandenong Hospital, Victoria in 1993. The right side of his face, arms and chest were fused together and the bottom of his mouth was attached to his chest. After the first operation, he wore a pressure suit which helped to heal his scars.

Mr Koni was taken in and cared for by a Salvation Army family.

The organisation's Cranbourne branch raised \$50,000 for his surgery with support flowing from across Australia after 60 Minutes featured the brave little boy's battle for life. A team of surgeons, nurses and anaesthetists also worked on his surgery at no charge.

Now Mr Koni volunteers his time with the Salvation Army helping care for underprivileged children at Macquarie Fields. He said it is a way of giving back to the army organisation which helped save his life.

"It is my way of saying thank you," he said. DHEE

AN ACT of goodwill is often returned when you least ex-pect it and that is what happened to Tails the Dry-cleaner in Camden when a customer turned to social media to say thanks after they returned \$5 found in a jacket pocket.

When staff at the Argyle St business find cash or other items in the pockets of clothing they attach it to their Look What We Found envelope on the garment after it has been cleaned.

Staff have been following the tradition handing back items for more than 20 years. Customer Kate Albertiri,

of Orangeville, said she was so surprised to see the envel-ope and \$5 returned that she wanted to thank the staff.

"I was really taken aback when I was handed the envelope and there was a \$5 note in it," she said.

"I posted it on Facebook straight away because I wanted to thank them for being so honest. You don't see that too much anymore."

Tails the Drycleaner own-

said they were gobsmacked when they saw the Facebook post because they had used the envelopes for so long.

"We always check the clothing because if people have a small coin in their clothes or even a biro, it can cause a lot of havoc on the dry-cleaning machine," Mrs

Smith said. She said over the years staff had found many items, including a funeral eulogy, wedding speech and keys in the pockets of cloth-

"We have even had a num-ber of bondage straps and lacy undies (found in the pockets of clothing).





"I really believe it is important to spend time cooking with my kids and teaching them healthy habits which they can pass on to their own children."



Allspice Chicken with Chimichurri and Brown Rice

#### Ingredients

¼ cup brown rice, 4 spring onions, finely sliced, 2 thsp currants, 4 thsp red wine vinegar, 2 cups baby spinach, 1 punnet cherry tomatoes, halved, 1 bunch basil leaves, 3 tsp ground cumin, 2 thsp extra virgin olive oil, 2 tsp allspice, 2 tsp olive oil, 8 chicken tenderloins, 2


bunches asparagus, 1 long red chilli, finely sliced, 3 garlic cloves, finely sliced **Method** 1. Place rice in small saucepan, cover

with hot water and bring to the boil, Reduce heat to simmer and cook for 20-25 minutes. Stir through spring onion, currants, cherry tomatoes, 2 tbsp vinegar and baby spinach. 2. To make chimichurri, finely chop basil

and combine in bowl with 2 tsp cumin, olive oil and remaining 2 tsp of vinegar.

3. Rub remaining cumin and allspice over chicken. Heat large frying pan with olive oil. Cook over high heat for 2-3 minutes each side. Remove chicken from pan and add asparagus, chilli and garlic. Cook for 2-3 minutes or until asparagus is bright green and lightly charred.

 Serve chicken and asparagus on rice with chimichurri to top.

## THE CAKE THAT WINS HEARTS

#### GERMAN CHOC-CHERRY CLASSIC

THE wife of Campbelltown Mayor Paul Hawker believes her cooking may be one of the reasons she won her husband's heart.

Sigrid Hawker, a talented cook with a love of German food, says Mr Hawker particularly enjoyed her German cake, schwarzwalderkirschtorte, otherwise known as black forest torte. "Paul loves and enjoys the dish. I

"Paul loves and enjoys the dish. I still believe that I first hooked him with my German cooking," she said.

Mrs Hawker said the cake recipe came from her mother. "My mother used to make it for special occasions because people always requested it," Mrs Hawker said.

"She is 90 now and I decided to learn how to cook it because I know that she can't be around forever."

The Bradbury resident relishes the chance to spread some of her German heritage to visitors.

"It's not a very difficult cake to cook and it's not super heavy. It does have a lot of layers – the chocolate sponge cake, the jelly from



the cherry juice, the cream and the cherries on top," she said.

"The best advice I can give is to cook it the day before to make sure it is really moist when you have visitors over."

The 60-year-old also has some handy tips when it comes to making the cherry jelly and putting the cream on top of the cake.

"With the jelly, I always drain

"With the jelly, I always drain the cherries first. Once I've done this, I boil the cherry juice and then use cornflour to make the liquid into a jelly," she said.

"Afterwards, when I have finished layering the cake, I always pick the cake up and lather cream on top while I am holding it.



Black Forest cake

#### Ingredients

1/3 cup plain flour, 1/3 cup self raising flour, 2 tbsp cocoa powder, 4 eggs separated, ½ cup caster sugar, 700g Morello cherries, 2 tsp comflour, 600ml thickened cream, 1 tbsp, icing sugar, ¼ cup Kirsch liqueur, dark chocolate for grating Method

 Drain cherries. Blend cornflour with 1/3 cup cherry juice. Place remainder of juice in saucepan and bring to boil. Add cornflour mixture, stir until thickens. Cool in fridge.

Preheat oven to 180C. Grease two 20cm sandwich tins, dust with flour and line base with circle of baking paper.

3. Sift flours and cocoa three times.
4. Beat egg whites, add sugar until mixture is thick and glossy. Add yolks. Add

ture is thick and glossy. Add yolks. Add sifted flour and cocoa. Mix and divide mixture between the two tins. Smooth top. Bake for 15 minutes. Cool.

Whip cream, adding icing sugar.
 Cut each cake in half horizontally.
 With each layer, spread Kirsch liqueur, thickened cherry jelly, cream and drained chemies. Spread creamover top

and sides.
7. Decorate with drained cherries and grated dark chocolate.

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

## Scammers try to access personal data over phone

Callers pretend to be helpful Telstra workers

A SCAMMER posing as a Telstra worker is targeting people by trying to hack into their personal computers over the phone.

Ingleburn husband-andwife Paul and Jan Neaves were contacted by a woman claiming to be Olivia Silva who ordered them to log on to their computer immediately as it was being hacked.

The woman then provided an ID number followed by an urgent message that hackers were attacking their Event Viewer, a file they had on their iPad but not their computer.
"When she asked us to

take the phone to the computer and press Control, I realised that we were being scammed," Mrs Neaves said. "She was going to

not right, hang up



somehow take control of the computer and steal my personal details which are saved on it."

Mrs Neaves said that the hacking scare came as a shock to the pair.

"There have been no more calls since then but when the Telstra repairman came out a few days later to fix the internet, he said Telstra would never ring up and do that.'

A Telstra spokesman said any attempt to deceive its customers with false information was "very concerning". He said never give an unsolicited caller remote access to your computer.

"Customers need to be prepared for scam callers and the advice we give them is to hang up immediately if they're not sure who is on the other end of the phone and to report the call to the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission

(ACCC)," he said.

Det-Sgt Rachel Fawett, of
Macquarie Fields police, said older people were more at risk because they did not have access to online warnings which a lot of people post on social media.

"If in doubt, ring the police and we can make a record of it," he said.

Red Cross spokeswoman Gemma Falkenmire was appealing for residents to become blood donors ahead of the mobile blood service's visit to Campbelltown Bunnings from February 22 to 25.

"There are times when donor numbers are traditionally low, such as long-weekends and cold and flu outbreaks, so we need additional donors to come on board," Ms Falkenmire said.

"We need to continue helping the one in three Australians who will need donated blood in their lifetime."

ment before they visited Bunnings Campbelltown to help the blood bank ensure the right amount of blood was collected.

"Appointments are really crucial as they help us keep track of how much blood we are collecting," Ms Falkenmire said.

"If we collect too much of one blood type we stop collecting it or we collect less.

"We need to be careful because we can't really stockpile the blood."

People aged between 16 and 70 are eligible to donate but residents should check the criteria. "We are trying to encourage new donors to donate but we also need them to check if they are eligible," Ms Falkenmire said.

"If it is their first time donating, we also encourage them to do it with someone else for the moral support.

"Drink lots of water and eat well.

"On the day the donor will have a health check, followed by 5-10 minutes of donating blood and then something to eat and drink will be provided by the blood service."


The blood service hopes to achieve its goal of an extra 115,000 donors by the end of the year.

## Service **NSW fix**

The only Service NSW shop that can do all transactions is inconveniently lo-cated at Gregory Hills after the closure of RMS services at Campbelltown and Ingleburn late last year.

"When I heard about the closures of the RMS I lobbied to have a Services NSW service," Mr Rowell said.

"The kiosk is now at Macarthur Square and I am ad-vised that it has helped many people and it has been quite busy. The services that are able to be provided in Campbelltown are numerous with many services not previously being available in our region."
